GOV. WILLSON'S PROCLAMATION.

Gov. Willson has given out the following Thanksgiving proclamation: "The President of the United States of America has, by a public proclamation, set aside Thursday, November 24, 1910, as a day of Thanksgiving and prayer to God, and, in harmony with that proclamation and the spirit of our Commonwealth, and in the name of the Commonwealth and of all its people, I unite in that action of the President."

No land and no people have so much to be thankful for, and I call upon our people to pray for God's right and justice to prevail in all lands, and throughout our land, in every neighborhood thereof.

Now, therefore, I, Augustus E. Willson, Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, have set aside and do hereby fix the 24th day of this November, 1910, as a day of general Thanksgiving and ask that in so far as in us lies all shall cease from toil and business and in our homes and places of worship truly thank our God for his blessings and gracious providence.

Done at the city of Washington, this fifth day of November, in the year of Our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and ten and of the independence of the United States the one hundred and thirty-fifth.

THANKSGIVING PROCLAMATION.

Washington, Nov. 6.—The vigorous growth and progress of the country as reflected by the records of population and harvests and the general conditions of international peace are things for which thanksgiving is especially due for the year 1910, according to the annual Thanksgiving day proclamation issued by President Taft to-day.

This year 1910 is drawing to a close. The records of population and harvests, which are the index of progress, show vigorous national growth and the health and prosperous well-being of our communities throughout this land and in our possessions beyond the seas.

Now, therefore, I William Howard Taft, President of the United States of America, in accordance with the wise custom of the civil magistrate since the first settlements in this land and with the rule established from the foundation of this Government, do appoint Thursday, November 24, 1910, as a day of National Thanksgiving and prayer, enjoying the people upon that day to meet in their churches for the praise of Almighty God and to return heartfelt thanks to him for all His goodness and loving kindness.

In witness thereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be fixed. Done at the city of Washington, this fifth day of November, in the year of Our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and ten and of the independence of the United States the one hundred and thirty-fifth.

## Great Building.

The people of Hopkinsville and Christian county have erected a great school building at Hopkinsville at a cost of \$100,000. This is one of the first joint County and City High Schools under the Sullivan Law. It shows the educational spirit in Christian county. It shows that Kentucky is coming to the front educationally. The people of Butler county have no room to complain about being taxed to build a \$12000 building, when Christian county spends a \$100,000 for a school building.

## Gets Jail Sentence.

F. D. Warren, of Girard, Kan., editor of the Appeal to Reason, must serve a term of six months in Federal prison, and pay a fine of \$1,000 imposed by a jury in the United States Court in Kansas.

Warren was accused of sending through the United States mails envelopes on the outside of which was printed, "\$1,000 reward will be paid to any person who kidnaps ex-Gov. Taylor and returns him to the Kentucky authorities."

The indictment charged that the words were scurrilous, defamatory and threatening in character and intended to reflect injuriously on the character of William S. Taylor.
