The State of Ohio -  
Stark County, ~~Count of Common Pleas - August Term 1832 -~~  
October

On this ~~ten~~ day of October it personally appears  
in open Court before the judges of the Court of Common Pleas of Stark  
County Ohio now sitting Leonard Drury a resident of said County of  
Stark aged seventy three years the seventeenth day of June last after  
being duly sworn according to law doth make and declare the  
following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of  
Congress passed June 9th 1832 - That he entered the service of the  
United States in harvest time of the year 1777 as a volunteer for  
six months in the Company commanded by Capt William Barnes  
of the Regiment of Maryland Troops commanded by Col Barnes -  
whose Christian name this defendant believes was Michael soon  
after this defendant joined the company the command of it was  
assumed by Thomas Reed or Harry or Henry Wingate was one of the  
subalterns defendant believes & unique defendant enlisted in  
service for six months and was with the Company discharged at  
Leonard-Town. Defendant lived in St Mary's County Maryland near  
the Cool Spring at the time of entering the service, and first marched  
to Point-Lock-But remained there some time, and then marched to  
a place below Bladensburg where the Company remained a short  
time, and then moved down the Potomac and then continued in  
that neighbourhood: there is no acton defendant had a written  
discharge from Col Barnes but lost it many years ago which is the  
only document defendant ever had showing he was in the service;  
does not know that any one of the Company or Regiment in which  
he served is now living by whom he parts from his service -

The Court pronounced the following interrogatories to which the  
following answers were returned -

Where, and in what year were you born?

I was born in St Mary's County Maryland not far from Leonard-Town  
on the 6<sup>th</sup> day of June 1759 -

Have you any record of your age, and if so, where is it?  
I have seen a record of my age in my Father's prayer book I have not seen  
it for many years, and I do not now know where it is -

Where were you living when called into service; where have you  
lived since the revolutionary war; and where do you now live?

I was living in St Mary's County Maryland near the Cool Spring at the

time of entering the service - after the revolutionary war I lived at Fort Tobacco for a few years, then near Frederick Town, then at Limestone <sup>then at Mt. Vernon</sup> Virginia, then at Martinsburgh Va, then near Hagerstown, ~~the day of his~~, then in Franklin County Pennsylvania, then I moved to Stark County Ohio where I now reside.

How were you called into service, were you drafted, did you volunteer, were you a substitute? And of a substitute for whom?

I entered the service of the United States as a volunteer for nine months.

I was not drafted, I volunteered, I was not a substitute -

State the names of some of the regular officers who were with the troops where you served; both continental and militia regiments as you can recollect, and the general circumstances of your service. I do not recollect the names of the regular officers who were with the troops where I served - nor the continental and militia regiments - nor do I recollect any more general circumstances connected with my discharge, than what have been before related -

Did you ever receive a discharge from the service, and if so, by whom was it given, and what has become of it?

I received a written discharge from Col Barnes, but lost it many years ago -

State the names of persons to whom you are known in your present neighbourhood, and who can testify as to your character for honesty and their belief of your service as a soldier of the revolution -

Charles Andrews, David Andrus, Elizibeth ~~Town~~ and ~~Isaac~~ <sup>service</sup> Duryell are among the neighbours who can testify to my character and belief of service -

And the said defendant hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any state -

We, David Andrus and Charles Andrews residing in the Township of Jackson, County of Stark and State of Ohio, hereby certify, that we are well acquainted with Leonard Duryell who has subscribed and sworn to the above declaration, that we believe him to be seventy three years of age; that he is reported, and believed to

the neighbourhood where he resides, to have been  
a soldier of the revolution, and that we concur  
in that opinion. — David Andrews

the interrogatories prescribed by the War Department,  
that the above named applicant was a revolutionary  
soldier, and served as he states. And the court  
further certifies, that it appears to them that David  
Andrews and Charles Andrews who have signed  
the preceding certificate, are residents in the town  
ship of Jackson as they state, and that their state-  
ment is entitled to credit. —
